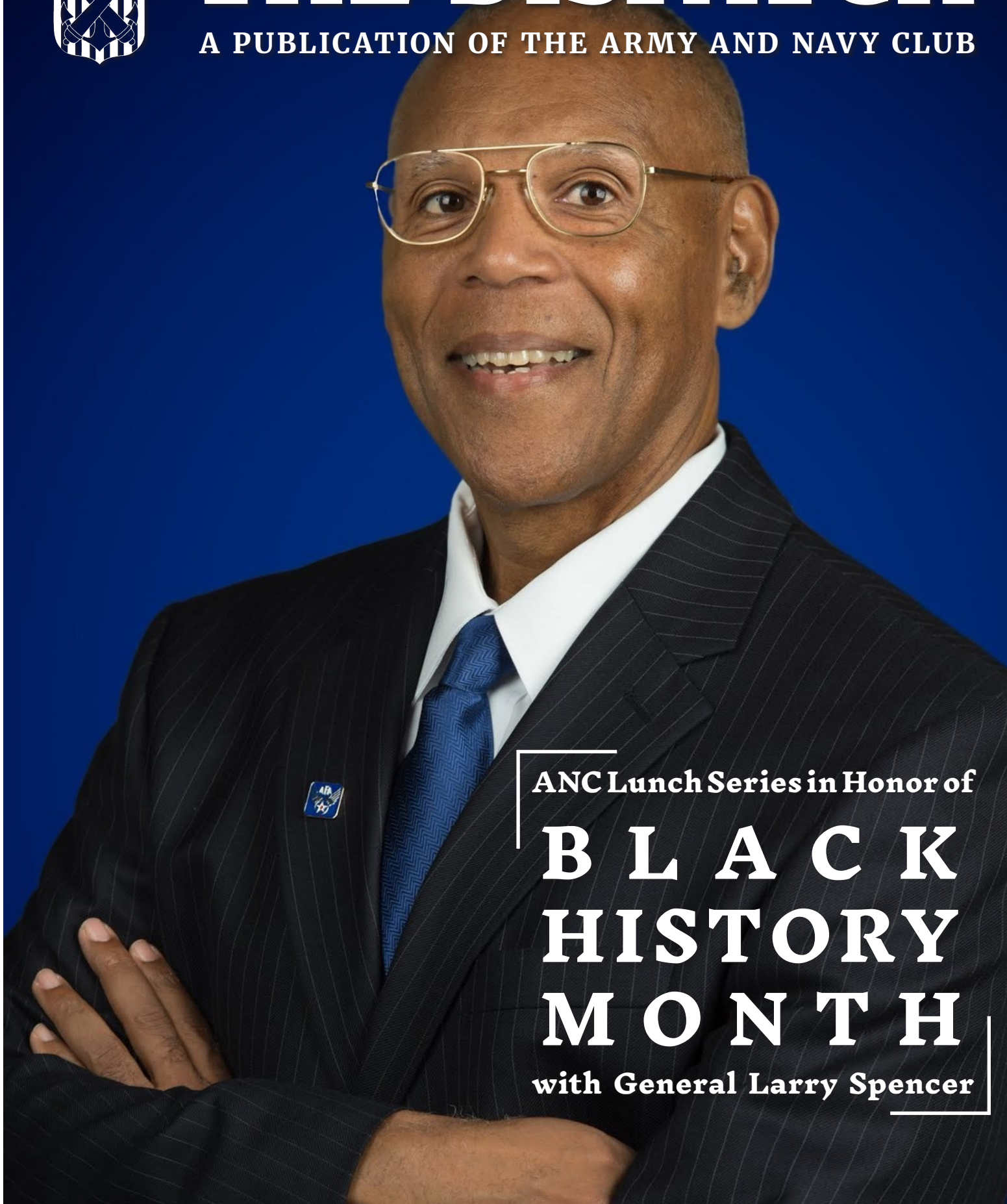

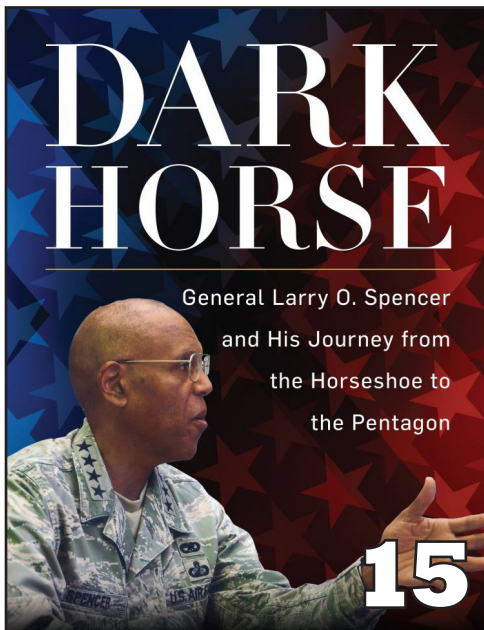

I'd like to close with a reminder about the Club's Special Event Cancellation Policy. We have recently experienced an increased number of "no-shows" for events which leaves empty seats and an appearance of disinterest. Out of respect for speakers/presenters and in order to accommodate as many members as possible, we will be strictly enforcing the Special Event Cancellation Policy as follows: Any cancellation made within 72 hours of the event date will result in the member's account being charged 50% of the event price. Cancellations made within 24 hours of the event, and no-shows, will result in the member's account being charged the full event price.

With this enforcement we hope to accommodate more members from the waitlists, so if an event sells out always leave your name. Inevitably there will be cancellations for a multitude of reasons and you're likely to get a spot.

I hope you enjoy the Club and all it has to offer this February!

CAPT Rhondalyn R. Cox-Burt

NAVY, UNITED STATES PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE (USPHS)

Captain Rhondalyn Cox-Burt, a proud member of The Army and Navy Club, has served over 26 years on active duty as a commissioned officer in the Navy and the USPHS. A native of Ohio, she is a lifelong Ohio State football fan. Rhondalyn earned her B.S and M.P.H degrees in Health Administration and Public Health from Indiana University, Bloomington, IN, and she is a definite Hoosier basketball fan.

Following graduation, Rhondalyn became a commissioned officer through the Navy's Officer Indoctrination School, Newport, RI. She was then stationed at the National Naval Dental Center and Naval Dental School, Bethesda, MD.

Since her transfer from the Navy to the USPHS in 2001, Rhondalyn has served in the Department of Health and Human Services at Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Health Services (formerly a Division of Immigration Health Services), the Office of USPHS Commissioned Corps Operations, and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Currently, at the FDA Office of the Ombudsman, Rhondalyn is responsible for addressing and resolving complaints from small businesses and the public. After assisting industry and the public better understand and navigate FDA policies and regulatory actions, Rhondalyn has researched and successfully negotiated closure of 8 important cases.

Additionally, her time at ICE Health Services provided a foundation for understanding health care delivery systems to vulnerable populations. Further experience within the Office of the U.S. Surgeon General, has helped her to shape Health and Human Services Policy and solve strategic public health issues.

Rhondalyn holds professional specialty certifications in Diversity/Equity/Inclusion, Pharmacy Technician, and Health Education. Additionally, she has professional experience and success in human subject research compliance, regulatory and public health policy, resource management, logistics, strategic planning, and standard operating procedures development. Recently, she completed the Executive M.B.A program at Howard University, Washington, D.C.

Rhondalyn, please tell us about yourself.

While I was born in Columbus, OH, I consider Cincinnati, OH my hometown. I enjoy reading (often 3-4 books at the same time) including thrillers, historical fiction, and social science. I am a fan of the arts and enjoy ballet and theater performances at the Kennedy Center. My husband and I enjoy attending live music at various venues. I am trained as a classical pianist. As a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., I participate in service activities with my Chapter – Xi Sigma Omega. I also enjoy sporting events as well as taking our dog on walks.

How did you hear about the Club and why did you join in 2002?

My former director and mentor, also a USPHS Commissioned Corps officer, was a member, told me about the Club, and served as a sponsor.

We understand that you left the Club in 2020 during the Covid era but rejoined this past March 2022. What brought you back? What attracts you to the Club?

I decided that membership in the Club was too valuable and rare to forgo. I find that the special brunches and dinners are unmatched. Over the years, I have had the opportunity to visit reciprocal clubs in OCONUS and CONUS. Visits to Le Cercle National des Armies in Paris, France and the River Club in Jacksonville, FL were especially outstanding. Reciprocal clubs are a tremendous benefit.

What are your proudest accomplishments in the Navy and the USPHS?

My proudest accomplishment in the Navy was when I stepped into my role, as a junior officer, supervising those who had been on active duty for at least a decade. As a new officer, being able to lead in that capacity was not easy but extremely rewarding. In the USPHS, I would have to say there are a couple. The first, being able to counsel junior officers and help them advance their careers and next, achieving the rank of O-6. I also would be remiss if I did not add, being able to take an active role in advancing public health.

We are fortunate to have enthusiastic, accomplished Club members of CAPT Cox-Burt's caliber. Her membership brings distinction to the Club. Her accomplishments have made her a role model which helps generate membership growth.

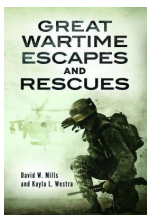

Command and General Staff College “History vs Hollywood”

“The Great Escape” with Dave Mills & Kayla Westra

In March 1944, more than six dozen Allied prisoners of Germany’s Stalag Luft III, a prison camp 100 miles southeast of Berlin, escaped through a tunnel they’d named Harry. Most were recaptured within days, and an enraged Adolf Hitler had 50 of them executed. Only three remained free. The inspiring, if ultimately tragic, story is told in one of the top-grossing films of 1963, the now-classic *The Great Escape*. It’s based on Paul Brickhill’s firsthand account in a 1950 book by the same name, but to what degree did Hollywood tinker with true events? Military historian David Mills and colleague Kayla Westra assess the historical accuracy of director John Sturges’ World War II adventure – from the details of tunnel construction to the prominence of American POWs in the mass breakout, and whether one escapee indeed managed to commandeer a motorcycle (as memorably depicted by Steve McQueen).



Mills and Westra are co-authors of the book *Great Wartime Escapes and Rescues*, published in 2019. He is an associate professor in the Department of Military History at the Army Command and General Staff College. Westra is the dean of liberal arts and K-12 partnerships and chief information officer at Minnesota West Community and Technical College.

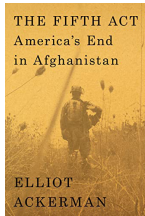

The Fifth Act is an astonishing human document that brings the weight of twenty years of war to bear on a single week, the week the war ended. Using the dramatic rescue efforts in Kabul as his lattice, Ackerman weaves a personal history of the war’s long progression, beginning with the initial invasion in the months after 9/11. It is a play in five acts, the fifth act being the story’s tragic denouement, a prelude to Afghanistan’s dark future. Any reader who wants to understand what went wrong with the war’s trajectory will find a trenchant account here. But *The Fifth Act* also brings readers into close contact with a remarkable group of characters, American and Afghan, who fought the war with courage and dedication, and at great personal cost. Ackerman’s story is a first draft of history that feels like a timeless classic.

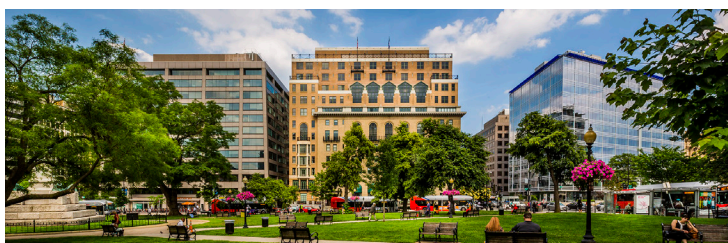
“Rebels at Sea: Privateering in the American Revolution” with Eric Jay Dolin

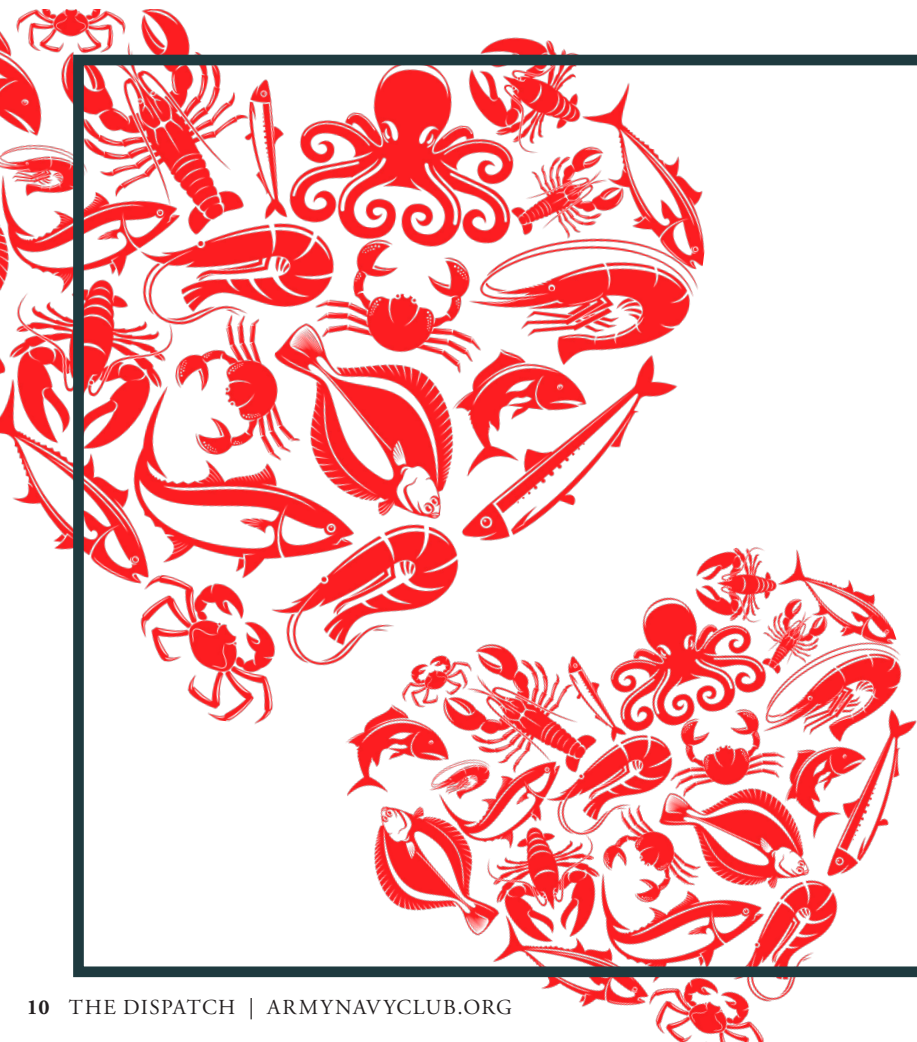

COCKTAILS OF THE MONTH



The Boulevardier is a variation on the classic Negroni that uses whiskey instead of gin to create a rich, warming flavor. This month's recipe features Jack Daniel's in honor of Black History Month.

The original recipe and distilling process for Jack Daniel's was created by an African American named Nathan "Nearest" Green who taught Jack Daniel how to perfect his craft but went unacknowledged for 150 years. 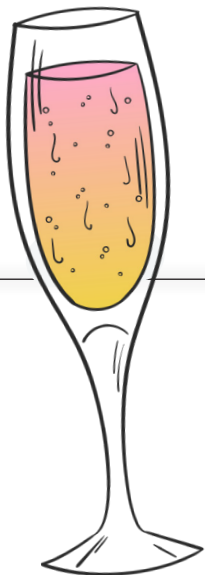

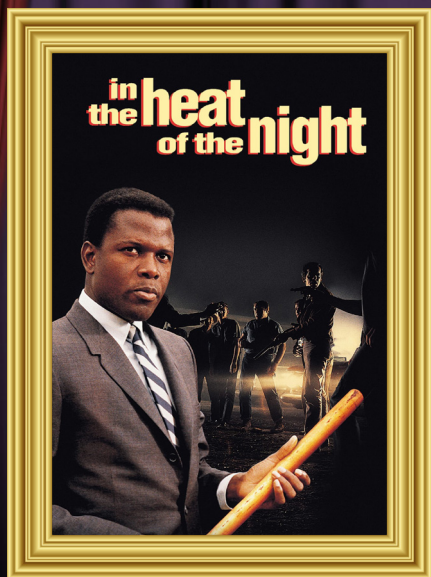

Dark Horse: General Larry O. Spencer and His Journey from the Horseshoe to the Pentagon

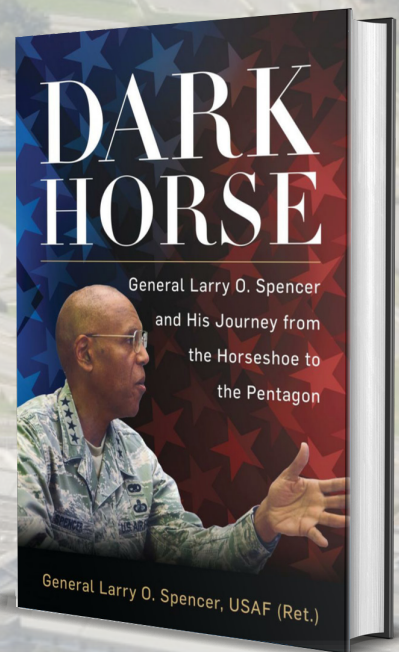

Gen. Larry Spencer, USAF (Ret.) was born and raised on the Horseshoe—a tough inner-city street in southeast Washington D.C. Both parents lived in the rural south under Jim Crow and “separate but equal” laws. Spencer’s father was a career Army soldier who lost his left hand during the Korean War, suffered from post-traumatic stress disorder, and worked two jobs. His mother completed tenth grade, had no driver’s license, and was left alone during the week to raise their six children. The Horseshoe was a hard neighborhood where fights were common, and the school systems were second-rate.

The expectations of living in an all-Black neighborhood were to be good at sports while shunning academic prowess. Spencer met those expectations: he struggled in school, but teachers who did not want to see him repeat their class would pass him to the next grade. That environment resulted in poor self-esteem and a bleak outlook for the future.

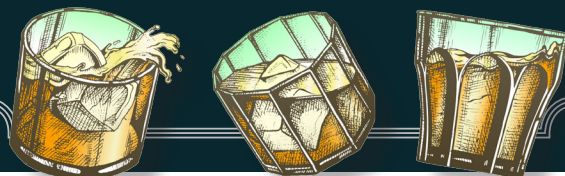
Quite by chance, Spencer enlisted in the U.S. Air Force where he continued to struggle with the racial turmoil of the 1970s. A senior non-commissioned officer saw promise in Spencer and guided him to obtain a college degree and apply for Officer Training School where he excelled. As a very young first lieutenant, he was assigned to a tough job in the Pentagon, but Spencer earned an early reputation as a fast burner. In 1990 he took command of a squadron that won accolades and awards for its performance during Operation Desert Shield/Storm. Spencer went on to serve at the White House, and then successfully commanded a Group and a Wing before being assigned as the chief financial officer (comptroller) for Air Combat Command, the largest command in the Air Force. During that assignment, Spencer was promoted to brigadier general and was tasked to set up a new Directorate at Air Force Materiel Command. Spencer later returned to the Pentagon where he led Air Force Budget. He ultimately became the Air Force’s thirty-seventh vice chief of staff, making him one of only nine African Americans promoted to four stars. Spencer concludes his historic climb with life lessons learned on his journey from the inner city to the Pentagon.

She was an elevator operator in those days before the 1980s Clubhouse renovation. She also worked in housekeeping, when the old Clubhouse had twice the number of overnight rooms than it has today. She has welcomed guests as both a Front Desk concierge and a valet, and has served them in both the Main Dining Room and the Eagle Grill. She worked as a banquet server in the Ballroom, the Washington Room, and the Iwo Jima/John Paul Jones Room. She was a bartender for the Main Dining Room, and then for the Daiquiri Lounge.

Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, USN

ARCHITECT OF VICTORY IN THE PACIFIC (1885-1966)

Nine days following the attack on Pearl Harbor, Rear Admiral Chester Nimitz, a member of the ANC since 1910, received a telephone call in his apartment at 2222 Q Street in Washington, D.C. from Secretary of the Navy, Frank Knox. Knox informed Nimitz that FDR had selected the 56-year-old rear admiral to relieve Admiral Husband Kimmel of command of the Pacific Fleet in the rank of admiral. Knox told him the President said, “tell Nimitz to get the hell out to Pearl Harbor and stay there until the war is won.”

FDR selected Nimitz over more senior admirals much to the consternation of some of them including the confrontational and pugnacious Admiral Ernest J. King who dismissed Nimitz as a “desk” or “political” admiral more suited to command one of the Navy’s Bureaus rather than a fleet. Nimitz’s selection to command the Pacific fleet in a time of great peril is a testament to FDR’s genius and to his in-depth knowledge of the Navy. The President who had been Under Secretary of the Navy in WWI considered himself a former naval person in the style of Winston Churchill and he knew most of the senior naval leadership by name and had sailed on many of the Navy’s capital ships.

Chester Nimitz was born in Fredericksburg, Texas on February 24, 1885. His grandfather, Charles Heinrich Nimitz, a Saxon German, emigrated to the U.S. and joined with other German immigrants and founded the town of Fredericksburg. After school, young Chester worked as a desk clerk at the hotel his stepfather managed. Newly minted West Point graduates on their way to postings in the West stayed at the hotel which was located at major crossroads. These well-mannered young men, resplendent in their cavalry uniforms, impressed Chester with their friendly demeanor and their air of worldliness, and he eventually sought an appointment to the Military Academy. All of the appointments were filled but the local congressman did have one appointment to the Naval Academy, but he had to conduct an examination to select the principal appointee. Chester studied diligently and received the highest

score on the examination. Another offspring of German immigrants, by the name of Dwight Eisenhower, wanted to attend the Naval Academy and no appointments were available so he opted for West Point and the rest is history.

One of Nimitz’s greatest strengths was his interpersonal skills and political acumen. He was patient, secure in his own right and saw loyalty and obedience as a two-way street. Instead of getting rid of the demoralized Pacific Fleet staff following the attack

at Pearl Harbor, Nimitz told them he did not blame them for what had happened and that he needed their expertise to win the war. Craig Symonds in his recent book *Nimitz At War* stated that Nimitz was “the centerpiece” of the war in the Pacific and he had “demonstrated that humility, careful listening, calm assessment, patience and the ability to recognize when to accept calculated risk brought military success as well as the admiration of those who executed his orders.” Ian W. Toll, the eminent naval historian and highly touted author of *The Pacific War Trilogy*, described Nimitz as “the greatest admiral in American history.”

I had the honor of living in Quarters 1, “Nimitz House” on Yerba Buena Island, the last official residence of the late fleet admiral. Living in this historic edifice encouraged me in my quest to learn more about the admiral, and I used the opportunity to host a dinner party for Sister Mary Aquinas (Nimitz) the admiral’s youngest daughter who was a Dominican Nun and head of the Biology Department at Dominican University. She provided me with great insight into her father’s character and personality which added to my knowledge about this great man. He died in 1966 at Nimitz House and is buried on a hill in Golden Gate National Cemetery surrounded by his closest wartime friends, Admiral Raymond Spruance, Vice Admiral Charles A. Lockwood and Admiral Richmond Kelly Turner and their wives.
